4 Walking among the weather-beaten buildings in RANGER 5 Bodie, California these days, you have to squint 6 hard to catch a glimpse of the high-life that once 7 called this remote gold mining town home. At 8374 8 feet of elevation, with the mines sitting at yet 9 another 700 feet higher, it is tough just walking along the old buildings. If you peer into the 10 11 dusty windows of the hotel, you might see the pool 12 cues laying on the table, the players just out of 13 sight, getting a ghostly beer at the bar. 14 But it was a different thing all together on July 15 4, 1880. 22 MUSIC: OLD-TIMEY UP AND UNDER

At the stroke of midnight, thirty steam whistles 23 RANGER smashed the silence at the 104th annual day of 24 25 Independence. The sun wasn't up yet when Hoskin's 26 brass band assembled outside the Belvedere Iron 27 Works, and enthusiastically, if not musically, rendered "Hail Columbia", "The Star Spangled 28 29 Banner," and other appropriate tunes. For anyone 30 who hadn't been awakened by the music, they 31 certainly couldn't miss the cannon blast at 32 sunrise. For this one day, the one hundred and

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1 forty-nine stamps of the nine quartz stamp mills 2 didn't beat out their tattoos as they smashed rock 3 into powder, to recover the gold from it. (MUSIC 4 FADE) 5 Yep, this was going to be Harlan Hightower's 6 special day. He could just feel it. The owner of 7 the Bodie Standard News had left him in charge. It 8 was his job to gather all the news of this 9 glorious day, and he had to start with that big 10 meeting at the Bodie Miners Union. He sprang out 11 of bed, and dressed in his finest. For Harlan, that was pretty fine, since he was known around 12 13 town as the Dandy. Dancing with excitement, he 14 SFX OPEN BOX opened the box that kept his most prized 15 possession safe-a double-high derby hat. SFX WALKING DOWNSTAIRS 16 17 LANDLADY Oh, my, Mr. Hightower! Don't you look fine! 18 Thank you, Mrs. Bennett. I have the rare privilege HARLAN 19 of riding in the parade with Miss Lilly. You don't say! That's a real feather in your cap. 20 LANDLADY Mrs. Bennett, you're joshing me! 21 HARLAN (SMILING) 22 RANGER He tipped his hat to her, and walked through the 23 doors of the Mono House on Mill Street. There was 24 a little trouble though, getting into the meeting 25 at the Miners Union Hall. 26 MALE CROWD CONVERSATIONS UNDER AD LIB: 27 BIG MIKE Harlan Hightower! You turned miner, have you? 28 HARLAN Not at all, Big Mike. I'm just here to report on 29 the doings of the meeting. 30 You're sure enough dressed purty. Well, take a BIG MIKE 31 seat over there in the second row, Mr. Hightower. 32 HARLAN Thank you, sir.

1	SFX	RAP OF A GAVEL
2	SHAUGHNESSY	I call this meeting to order. Order! Shut up!
3	(NO RESPONSE	E FROM THE MEN WHO CONTINUE TALKING.)
4	SFX	GUN SHOT
5	AD LIB	OUT (EVERYONE IS STUNNED)
6	SHAUGHNESSY	(IRONIC) Thank you for your attention.
7	PADDY	You didn't have to shoot us, Shaughnessy!
8	SHAUGHNESSY	Sometimes a gun is the only thing you mugs will
9		listen to! Now The first order of business on
10		this fine July 4 is a sad one. Some of you already
11		have heard that there was a cave-in at the Bodie
12		last night.
13	AD-LIB	(SURPRISE, SHOCK)
14	SHAUGHNESSY	(Con't) Only a small one-but two of our members
15		went to see their maker-Tad Kingsby and George
16		Zinnerman. Let's pass the hat for their families,
17		and everyone dig deep. Mr. Hightower, could we
18		prevail on you to supply the hat?
19	HARLAN	Of course, Mr. Shaughnessy.
20	SHAUGHNESSY	Thank you. While the hat is being passed, we can
21		get on with the main reason for this meeting. We
22		have been invited to be participate in the annual
23		parade down Main Street
24	PADDY	I object! They don't want the likes of us paradin'
25		down their street!
26	SHAUGHNESSY	Paddy, they asked us!
27	PADDY	Only a rotten stinkin' way to get us gussied up! I
28		don't wanna wear a clean suit!
29	BIG MIKE	Paddy, you don't even have one!
30	AD LIB	LAUGHTER
31	PADDY	It's a disgrace for us honest miners to walk in
32		their nose-in-the-air parade.

1 SHAUGHNESSY Paddy, shut your gob. 2 PADDY We're honest miners, we are. We don't need no 3 airs. 4 SHAUGHNESSY I think it's an honor for us to be in the parade. 5 I don't! I got as much a right to say what I think PADDY 6 as any of youse guys. 7 (EVERYONE WANTS TO MARCH IN THE PARADE) AD LIB 8 I don't want to walk in the parade! You can't make PADDY 9 me, you lilly-livered high=graders! 10 BIG MIKE Shut-up and sit down, Paddy! 11 I won't shut up! And you can't make me sit down, PADDY 12 you bastard! 13 SHAUGHNESSY That's ENOUGH! Big Mike, remove Mr. O'Carrol from 14 the premises! 15 BIG MIKE Yes, sir! 16 SHAUGHNESSY And keep him out! 17 PADDY This is outrageous! I'll come back and you'll see 18 what I can do ... You think you're so high and 19 mighty... 20 SHAUGHNESSY Paddy O'Carrol! You have disrupted this meeting 21 for the last time! 22 PADDY You can't do that. Get your hands off me! Let me 23 go! It's a free country! 24 AD LIB (MEN) STRUGGLING TO GET PADDY OUT 25 MUSIC: THEME UNDER 26 "Goodbye God, we're going to Bodie!" It was a rare RANGER 27 day in Bodie that didn't have a new body to bury, and July 28 4 was no exception. The surprise was that it happened so 29 early in the day. (MUSIC OUT)

2	RANGER	To look at the crowd that day, you would think no
3		one stayed home-it was one big jumble of all kinds
4		of people elbowing each other and cheering from
5		balconies. Chinese, Irish, Welch, Easterners,
6		each pushing for a good viewing spot. Excited
7		children ran up and down the street, adding to the
8		noise.
9		Up at the "Community center" the large crowd had
10		to endure several long-winded orations and listen
11		to numerous recitations by children forced into
12		the limelight by adoring parents. And there were
13		the humorous orations given by "The Horribles"-a
14		collection of local hams who kept the crowd in an
15		uproar. (MUSIC OUT)
16	<u>efx western</u>	I TOWN AMBIANCE (PLUS LIVE SOUND: HORSES, ETC)UNDER
17	RANGER	Main Street was hung from one end to the other
18		with decorations of flags and evergreen, and
19		almost obliterated with streamers of bunting.
20		The parade down Main Street was a colossal one:
21		Carriages, freight wagons, the volunteer fire
22		brigade with their pumper and horses. And what
23		horses! And in one of the open carriages was the
24		town's dandy.
25	SFX	SOUND OF CARRIAGE ON GRAVEL
26		Mr. Hightower was elegantly attired in his new
27		outfit, topped by his gleaming two-story derby
28		hat. Along with him were some equally elegant
29		ladies. It was an extremely warm Fourth of July,
30		and whenever our hero raised his hat to wipe his
31		sweaty brow, the crowd near him turned their
32		heads.

1 HARLAN (MUSING) Hmm...That's peculiar... 2 Then he spotted a friend of his at the side of the RANGER 3 street. 4 DANDY (CALLING) Sam! Sam Kemp! Up here! 5 WALKING IN GRAVEL ALONGSIDE THE CARRIAGE SFX 6 SAM Harlan Hightower! By heaven, that's a grand 7 outfit. Stop by my shop later, and I'll take a 8 photograph of you. 9 HARLAN Thanks, Sam. Ma would like that. 10 SAM Whew! What in thunder have you been doing with 11 yourself? That scent you give off is terrible! 12 I don't rightly know. You mean it's not the breeze HARLAN 13 blowing down the canyon? 14 Nope-you can't blame this on the slaughterhouse. SAM 15 The breeze isn't coming from there. Driver, stop. Mr.Kemp, help me down. 16 MISS LILLY 17 SAM But Miss Lilly! I thought you wanted to ride in 18 the parade. 19 HARLAN Miss Lilly! You promised! 20 MISS LILLY (WITH A SNIFF) Under the circumstances, I think 21 I'd be happier sitting this one out. Coming, 22 girls? 23 No, Miss Lily, I'll stay. 'Tain't often I ride in SALLY 24 a carriage. 25 BECKY So will I. Thanks, ladies. The pleasure is mine. 26 HARLAN 27 MUSIC: OLD-TIMEY UP AND UNDER 28 RANGER The others riding with him suffered in silence, 29 held their noses, and made wry faces. There were 30 saplings placed in buckets tied to the awning 31 supports that led from Main Street to the 32 Fairgrounds. The parade ended at the fairgrounds.

1		There was the barbeque, with several steers
2		roasted in a large pit, followed by the pie
3		auction. Mr. Hightower dutifully wrote down the
4		miners who won the drilling contests, where miners
5		attempted to sink their hand drills into a granite
6		boulder in a set number of minutes. He didn't
7		understand the smirking looks that some of the
8		miners gave him, but he did notice them. There was
9		a boxing contest, and a number of foot races. And
10		then there were the horse races, with wagers being
11		placed left and right. (MUSIC OUT)
12		By the time he staggered home, his notebook was
13		crammed full of scribbled notes for the paper.
14		He was a little surprised at his reception when he
15		returned to the Mono House. He was feeling so
16		successful in completing his tasks.
17	LANDLADY	My lands, Mr. Hightower! Have you got some
18		terrible disease?
19	HARLAN	Of course not! Why do you ask that?
20	LANDLADY	WellIt's that smell.
21	HARLAN	What smell?
22	LANDLADY	Mr. Hightower, please let me send for the doctor.
23		There must be something horribly wrong. And open
24		the window!
25	HARLAN	All right, you send for the doctor. But I am fine.
26		Fit as a fiddle.
27	MUSIC: THEME	E UP AND UNDER
28	RANGER	When the doctor arrived, he looked his patient
29		over very carefully. Nothing wrong with his right
30		arm, nothing wrong with his left arm. The same was
31		true with the right leg and also the left leg.
32		Nothing the matter with either foot. He examined

1		the Dandy's right ear, and left ear, looked in his
2		mouth and up his nose. Shaking his head, he
3		finally reached for the Dandy's hat. He sniffed it
4		and said (MUSIC OUT)
5	DOCTOR	(SNIFF) You must have bought this thing before it
6		was ripe.
7	HARLAN	Doc, That hat cost me plenty-all the way from St
8		Louis!
9	RANGER	The doctor turned his back on the anxious patient,
10		and made a closer examination.
11	DOCTOR (ANX)	IOUSLY) Have you made a will? Are you prepared for
12		your maker?
13	HARLAN (WOR	RIED) I have always led a decent life, sir.
14		(BEAT) Doc, dodo I have time for a preacher?
15	DOCTOR	Mrs. Bennett, would you have a look at this hat?
16		Tell me what you see.
17	LANDLADY	(PUZZLED) It's just ahat, doctor.
18	DOCTOR	No, look hereunder the sweatband
19	LANDLADY	Inside the hat? Under the sweatband? Let's
20		see, if I turn this over
21	SFX	OPENING HATBAND
22	LANDLADY	Why it'sit'sa piece of limburger cheese!
23	DOCTOR	
24	LANDLADY	BOTH BREAK INTO LAUGHTER
25	RANGER	The doctor and the landlady doubled over with
26		laughter as they showed the Dandy his hat. The
27		patient turned livid, grabbed his revolver, and
28		ran out the door.
29	SFX	RUNNING FOOTSTEPS UNDER
30	HARLAN	I'll get those black-hearted swine that set me up!
31		Must have been some of those miners! I thought

1		they were laughing at me! All day-they were
2		laughingat me!
3	SFX	RUNNING STOP
4	MUSIC: HAND	TROLLEY UP AND UNDER
5	RANGER	No homicide was reported so it is assumed he
6		thought better of his intentions and accepted the
7		prank for what it was.
8		Celebrants in other communities usually enjoyed
9		the holiday with the same verve and vivacity. The
10		evening often ended with a tremendous bonfire, and
11		everyone who was still able to walk attended a
12		fancy ball.
13		It was certainly a day to look forward to, and a
14		day to remember. July 4, 1880, Bodie California.
